Dear Friends and Colleagues:

At the end of May the Board of Trustees met for three very intensive days in Lisbon. It was exhausting and exhilarating. Our main task was to concretize the many issues of the restructuring of the IIBA into specific structures and policies. This we did with a strong sense of purpose and with a spirit of collaboration and respect and appreciation for each members' ideas and vision, and each members' representation of her or his constituency. By the end we had succeeded in articulating a vision that I believe takes account of much of the feedback you, the members, have provided us. Space does not permit me here to go into detail, some of which I have already communicated. But our next step will be to develop a strategic plan for the IIBA and that will show all the elements we worked on: vision, mission, goals, programs and budget changes, as a basis for us to move forward as an organization.

Another issue that preoccupied us at the Board meeting, and at the IIBA Faculty meeting (we met jointly for half a day), was the relationship between the IIBA and the Alexander Lowen Foundation. As many of you know, there was great concern stimulated by some of the actions carried out in the name of the Foundation, and it was felt that we in the IIBA should take some steps to address these concerns. I am pleased to report that the need for any such steps was ended by changes in the Lowen Foundation which have allowed us to proceed to a collaborative mutually supportive relationship. Fred Lowen and I (and our families) spent some time at the beach (an ideal place for reducing tensions; and as every bioenergetic therapist knows, you can't hide much when you're only wearing a bathing suit), and the outcome was a resolve to work together. In the end we share a common wish to bring our work to people, with its potential for reducing suffering and enhancing constructive action. The Board will designate a committee to continue and develop this relationship between the two organizations.

The meeting in May represented the last official meeting of Barbara Bendel with the Board, and much was said in appreciation of her commitment and contribution to the IIBA. In July I met with Barbara and our new administrator, Pilar Llobregat, to facilitate the changeover in administration (see photo). When you have occasion to correspond with the IIBA (or before), please take a moment to introduce yourself to Pilar and welcome her. Pilar is situated in Barcelona, and was for many years a teacher of English, and has facility as well in Portuguese and French. She is still getting herself oriented to the IIBA, our culture as an organization and the administrative requirements of the job. I have every confidence that she will be a great addition to the IIBA.

Planning for the 2011 IIBA conference has been intensive, and the program and the site look outstanding. Please keep an eye out for more information coming to you over the next few months. The next Professional Development Workshop was held in Northern California in October 2010. A number of IIBA members went on to (and presented at) the USABP conference shortly thereafter. Elections to the IIBA Board of Trustees were held recently, thank you for making your views known. The IIBA website is undergoing renovation and improvement, please check it out.

All-in-all it has been a time of growth, development, challenge and solution. In the end, the function of the IIBA is to support its membership in the difficult and essential work of bioenergetic psychotherapy. Let us all work together to that end. It is my privilege to work with a dedicated, creative, hard-working group of people moving our maturation forward. It is my privilege to do my part in our communal work together.

I hope other members will find ways to communicate about our deeper more personal reasons for being involved with the local, regional, and international bioenergetic groups. I hope to hear from you.

REPORTS

Board of Trustees meeting

The IIBA Board of Trustees met from February 3-7, 2011 in Lisbon. We welcomed re-elected and newly elected members of the Board. On behalf of the Board I am sending you this report on some of the highlights of the meeting.

At the top of our list is the status of the IIBA as a registered not-for-profit organization which can take in monies and sign contracts, and in general do the business of the association. When Barbara Bendel resigned as executive secretary of the IIBA in July, the administrative office of the IIBA was moved to Barcelona where our new, and very capable administrator, Pilar Llobregat resides. Unfortunately, while the personnel transition went very smoothly, the bureaucratic one did not. Without going into details, of which there are many, it has turned out to be very difficult to create a legal tax-exempt entity in Spain. We have been working very intensively for months now, seeking a solution that will work for the IIBA, and that will endure.

It might seem that this is just a bureaucratic hassle that must be gotten through; I certainly have felt the toll of it on my energy and availability to do other things. But it must be viewed, I believe, also as a step in the maturation of the organization. We are having to think about the long-term welfare of the IIBA, the importance of its mission to support members in our work as Bioenergetic therapists, and the value that brings to our world. We will keep you informed of our progress in creating this structure for all of us.

In keeping with our mission of supporting members, the Board went ahead to finalize the plan to rebate 15% of dues payments to Federations, Societies, and other entities in the IIBA. This way, local groups can use resources in creating those ways most suited to the situations in their areas. The IIBA will continue to develop resources and activities for all members, and I am very pleased to tell you that Dr. Patrizia Moselli has agreed to chair the Scientific Committee for the next IIBA conference to be held in Europe in 2013. Meanwhile the plans for the 2011 conference in San Diego are very exciting, and I hope all of you will be there to join in.

We have new very stylish and up-to-date website, and we are now working to refine it and assure that it serves the needs of our members well. The next issue of the IIBA Journal will be mailed out shortly. It was a carefully considered decision by the Board to continue publishing a physical book for the Journal, despite the cost. But in all other ways we are moving, as so many other professional organizations are, to do all our publications electronically. We know that there are a small number of our members still not receiving their information that way, and we do not wish to exclude them in any way, but the costs associated with printing and mailing are very high. So we are beginning to ask all our members to become available for electronic communication. In the near future we will discontinue all print and mail communication that is not essential. At the same time, the English version of the Bioenergetic Reader is very near publication and will be available as well at the IIBA conference coming up.

A major reason for the change in communication form is the careful effort the Board has made to cut our expenses, and to be very vigilant about spending. Right now the IIBA has a good financial cushion. However, we all know that not-for-profit professional organizations like ours live on a very narrow margin. And so we continue to monitor ourselves very closely. A full budget will accompany the official minutes of the meeting which will be posted online as soon as they are ready and approved.

The most important work we are doing right now on the Board is bringing to life the commitment we have to each other, to the members of the IIBA, and to the work we all do. We are striving to mature ourselves into a group that listens to each other respectfully, that faces reality, that discusses things openly and freely, and that makes its decisions by consensus. While this remains a continuous effort, we have so far been quite successful, and we hope our work communicates itself to you in the excitement and inclusiveness we feel. This spirit has its concrete expression in the Strategic Plan we are developing. This plan has been worked over and added to and amended. Once it is complete, it will lead to proposed by-law changes that will solidify the work of so many, over many years to restructure the IIBA into a self-sustaining membership based organization with a long future ahead of it. It is regrettable that basic matters of organizational existence have kept us from devoting more energy to the elaboration of the Plan and its adoption, but this too is about facing reality and doing what needs to be done. In the near future I will send you a newly edited and revised version of the Plan for your input before the Board has one more day-long discussion of it when we are all together in San Diego.

Meanwhile, send us your thoughts, comments, suggestions, dissatisfactions, questions, good will, and love. And tell your friends who are not yet members, this is the place to be.

The 2010 PDW took place Oct. 15-20 at the beautiful Mount Madonna Retreat Center in Northern California lead by IBA faculty members Elaine Tuccillo and Diana Guest. We had quite an international group with attendees from Brazil, Israel, New Zealand, Canada and the US. The depth and richness of the presentations was notable. We had lively discussions on the topics of somatic transference, relational dynamics, and power. We began each day with bioenergetic exercises lead by an IBA faculty applicant and there was such diversity and creativity with grounding. Scott Baum also joined the group for the last half and led a dynamic discussion on Monday night.

Prof. Dr. Joachim Bauer M.D. is Professor of Internal Medicine and Professor of Psychiatry at Albert-Ludwigs-Universität Freiburg, Germany. His medical proficiency covers the fields of internal medicine, psychiatry and psychosomatic medicine.

Dr. Helen Resneck-Sannes Ph.D. is a licensed psychologist, with training in various analytic, somatic, trauma based, and cognitive behavioral psychotherapies. She has taught in universities and colleges and trained other therapists throughout the United States, France, Spain, Italy, Canada, Brazil, and New Zealand. Her writing has been pioneering in their integration of transference, developmental, and somatic concepts in the theory and practice of psychotherapy. She is a member of the IIBA Faculty.

Our plan for all keynote addresses is to have translation into French, German, Italian, Portuguese and Spanish.

Continuing Education Credits


